



PACE Weekly: Recap of LeadingAge Updates

March 11, 2022

LeadingAge Coronavirus Call. 2022 looks promising for providers of services for older adults but some significant obstacles remain. LeadingAge members are anxious to hear about the latest trends on workforce and occupancy and how knowing about these trends can support planning for the “new normal” with COVID-19 in 2022. On Monday March 14 at 3:30 PM ET we will talk with Lana Peck, Senior Principal at the National Investment Center for Seniors Housing and Care. She will discuss the latest data from the NIC WAVE study of trends in senior living. She will offer insights on workforce and occupancy challenges and guidance on how LeadingAge members can prepare for growth this year. Will the \$1.5 T spending bill become law? And, ongoing discussion about COVID funding being cut from Omnibus package. The Senate is rushing to pass the \$1.5 Trillion package before Friday, when the government runs out of funding at midnight. The bill will require 60 votes to pass and overcome a filibuster. If the bill is not passed by Friday night, another continuing resolution is likely, to give the Senate more time to finish its work.

The Senate is not discussing COVID response money because it was cut from the House bill. In response to the White House’s \$22.5 billion request to cover immediate needs to avoid severe disruptions to the nation’s COVID response, the House initially included some funds (\$15.6 billion) in the Omnibus bill, but not the full amount. It appeared there was bipartisan agreement on the \$15.6 billion, offset in part by rescinding some unspent state funds. The deal fell apart when some Democrats objected to losing some of their relief funds. COVID response funds were stripped from the bill. It is unclear how the funds will make it into law without the state relief offsets. House Democrats are working on a bill that is separate from the Omnibus measure, but it is unlikely to survive in the Senate. Among the immediate needs that are at risk of not being covered are testing capacity, set to decline this month; the supply of mAB treatments, which will run out in May; and the supply of antiviral pills like Paxlovid, which will be exhausted in September.

Medicare Telehealth Flexibility Extensions Included in FY 22 Omnibus. The House is set to vote on a sweeping fiscal year (FY) 2022 Omnibus spending package that funds the government through the end of the fiscal year. One of the key extensions in the Omnibus spending package is the continuation of several key Medicare telehealth flexibilities. Most notably, the legislation would allow these flexibilities to be extended for 151 days (or five months), starting the day after the end of the public health

emergency (PHE). Given that we expect the public health emergency to end in July, this would allow the telehealth extensions to be in place through mid- December. You can read an article [here](#), which also outlines the key Medicare telehealth flexibilities included in the omnibus.

Interview with Dr. Ziyad Al-Aly – March 7. Dr. Ziyad Al-Aly, Director of the Clinical Epidemiology Center at Veterans Affairs St. Louis Health Care, joined the March 7, LeadingAge Coronavirus Update call. “Does The House Fit? Residents’ Experiences of Home Accessibility.” New research released from the Joint Center for Housing Studies of Harvard University looks at peoples’ experiences with their housing’s accessibility. According to the research, of the nation’s households, about 5% or 6.8 million, have at least one resident who has a hard time getting into, getting around, or using their home. More than half of households who had a hard time using their home were living in a household headed by someone 65 or older. Fully 10% of households headed by someone 80 or older had a resident with a difficulty using the kitchen, bathroom, or both. Among older adult-headed households, one-third of households with a resident who used a manual wheelchair, electric wheelchair, a crutch, or other mobility aid also reported difficulty navigating or using the home. This compares with just 2% of older adult households without a resident who used a mobility aid. The researchers also found that housing fit was linked to both income and tenure status. Across age groups, higher income residents had better housing fit, the researchers found. Ten percent of households with incomes below \$30,000 reported fit difficulties as compared with just three percent of households with incomes of at least \$75,000. Older renters had poorer housing fit as compared with owners, with almost a quarter of renters over 80 reporting difficulties getting around or using the home as compared with closer to 15% of owners in this age group.
