## Senior Housing Weekly: Recap of LeadingAge Updates

## August 14, 2020

**COVID-19 Supplemental Payment Requests – Authorized Signatures Required –** Housing provider reimbursement requests for COVID-19 expenses under the CARES Act were due to HUD on August 5<sup>th</sup>; HUD has granted additional time for providers to resubmit their previously submitted request forms, if the original submission was not signed by the owner or owner agent with legal authority to commit the owner to the terms of the CARES Act distributions (usually authorized through a board resolution or other means.) **REAC Memo on Restarting Inspections; Prioritization "Heat Map"** – On August 7<sup>th</sup>, HUD <u>announced</u> that the agency will resume Real Estate Assessment Center (REAC) inspections of HUD multifamily and public housing properties in early October. HUD had halted physical inspections on March 13<sup>th</sup> due to health concerns; the agency said it will utilize strict safety protocols to restart operations. According to HUD's <u>press release</u>, standard 14-day physical inspection notifications to owners will resume no earlier than September 21<sup>st</sup>, 2020, with the first inspections resuming on or about Monday, October 5<sup>th</sup>. Inspections will be prioritized based on a state or locality's COVID-19 rates, as well as on the property's previous scores, but will exclude senior housing communities in initial return to operations. On August 10<sup>th</sup>, REAC released a <u>memo on its plans to return to operations</u>; HUD also developed a "<u>heat map</u>" based on an area's risk level (if you click the map, you'll see an excel spreadsheet with more detail).

**Congressional Update and White House Executive Actions**. Last week the negotiations between the White House and Democrats on the fifth coronavirus bill that we have been advocating for fizzled. The President then issued several "Executive Orders" (formally "memoranda") responding to provisions that had expired, including one on the lapsed evictions moratorium: Executive Order on Fighting the Spread of COVID-19 by Providing Assistance to Renters and Homeowners. This order replaces the moratorium on evictions that expired with a directive to CDC and the Secretary of HHS to "consider whether any measures temporarily halting evictions of tenants for failure to pay rent are reasonably necessary to prevent the spread of COVID-19 from one State to another." The Secs. of Treasury and HUD are directed to identify federal funds to provide temporary assistance to renters and may include providing assistance to landlords including affordable housing owners and public housing authorities. There is no timeline on implementing the order. We are urging Congress and the Administration to take quick action to protect renters and support housing providers.

Letter to Congress on the next relief package – On August 11<sup>th</sup>, Katie Sloan sent a <u>letter to all</u> congressional offices stating our disappointment with Congress' decision to leave town without negotiating a deal on critical coronavirus relief legislation. Furthermore, the Executive Orders issued by President Trump responding to expired coronavirus provisions do not address these essential needs. LeadingAge members are stepping up to act for older adults every day. We are imploring Congress to step up and act as well. We are continuing our advocacy efforts with outreach to the Administration, Congressional leaders and the media to highlight these concerns and ensure that we must provide relief now.

Action Alert for Housing Relief – On August 13<sup>th</sup>, we sent all members of LeadingAge an action alert to urge Congress to come back to work and provide real relief to aging services and housing providers. Our action alert requests further financial relief for housing providers, paired with meaningful evictions protections.
