

Nursing Home Weekly: Recap of LeadingAge Updates

Upcoming LeadingAge Policy Update Call. On Monday, February 27 at 3:00 PM ET, Andrew Banoff, President and CEO of Jewish Senior Services (JSS) will join us to talk about his book "5200 Sundays", a reflection of his 20 years of serving, learning from, and making relationships with centenarians and other elders at JSS. ACTION ALERT: Tell Congress to "Get Real on Ratios" in Nursing Homes. CMS is poised to issue a rule imposing a federal minimum staffing mandate on nursing homes. On February 1, LeadingAge sent a letter to Congressional leaders requesting that they take legislative action to prevent the implementation of a staffing mandate without first addressing longstanding workforce and reimbursement challenges. CMS Offers More Details on the End of the PHE. On February 23, CMS released <u>updates</u> to continue to help all health care providers prepare for the end of the Public Health Emergency (PHE). Within the updates, the "<u>long term care facilities</u> (<u>skilled nursing facilities and/or nursing facilities</u>" link appears to include one change from earlier versions of the update. The new information offers additional details about payment and billing for vaccines after the end of the PHE. Immunizers will no longer be able to bill Medicare directly for vaccines to individuals in a Part A stay after June 30, 2023. Beginning July 1, typical SNF consolidated billing regulations will be in place. The document reiterates what LeadingAge reported in this article, in part based on information shared at the February 22 nursing home stakeholder call. It includes the fact that the 3 day stay waiver will end at the end of the PHE.

CMS Analysis Shows Shorter SNF Lengths of Stay for Certain ACOs with Waiver of 3 Day Stay. On February 17, CMS published a new <u>analysis</u> of certain Accountable Care Organizations' (ACOs) use of a waiver of the 3 day hospital stay prior to SNF coverage. The analysis found shorter SNF lengths or stay and higher rates of discharge to home for waiver stays, as well as lower or similar rates of adverse outcomes compared to non-waiver stays.

PHE Will End Waivers But Not Rules. We are continuing to learn how the May 11 termination of the PHE will impact our various provider settings. On a national nursing homes stakeholder call on February 22, CMS provided clarification on how the end of the PHE impacts the regulatory waivers and interim final rules implemented during the COVID PHE. Any waivers still in effect will terminate on May 11. Because the PHE is ending, HHS will not have the authority to extend waivers or approve new waivers, even on an individual basis, related to COVID-19. Interim final rules are effective for 3 years from the date of publication unless otherwise noted. While the COVID-19 testing rule will end with the PHE, CMS cautions providers that they will be required under infection prevention and control requirements to follow CDC's nationally accepted standards, which currently include testing and other mitigation strategies related to COVID-19. Staffing Study Complete, CMS Still Reviewing. On the national nursing home stakeholder call on February 22 CMS once again confirmed that the staffing study is complete. The study included literature reviews, site visits, quantitative and qualitative data analysis, and cost analysis. CMS is currently reviewing the report including data on time requirements and barriers/unintended consequences. Proposed staffing standards are expected in spring 2023.

Nursing Home Transparency Proposed Rule. CMS published a proposed rule related to nursing home ownership transparency on February 15. Read a summary of this rule here. On the February 22 national nursing homes stakeholder call, CMS clarified that Skilled Nursing Facilities will submit information through the 855A form or PECOS upon enrollment and revalidation, while Medicaid-only nursing homes will submitted information through a process outlined by the state. CMS intends to release an updated 855A form for these purposes in summer 2023. Data will be made publicly available on the CMS data site within one year of publishing the final rule.

New Analysis: MA Enrollment Growth Slows in 2023. Chartis Group recently reviewed 2023 Medicare Advantage enrollment data and found MA enrollment only grew by 1.5 million lives in 2023 (5.5%), down from the 9% growth of the prior year. The past three years have seen an average of 2 million new enrollees into MA plans. In 2023, MA enrollment declined for the first time in 3 states – CA, CT, IL -- and DC while Medicare FFS enrollment grew in these states. Included in its <u>report</u>, Chartis updated its map showing 2023 MA penetration and growth rates by state. New this year, it has created what it calls a "Medicare Advantage Competitive Enrollment Dashboard," which shows what is happening in each state. Specifically, it provides county-level view for each state showing MA penetration and state-level MA enrollment trend information, Special Needs Plan growth, the breakdown of for-profit vs. nonprofit

plans by market share and lists the top plans (based on market share) in the state. It can be accessed here. Once on the page, select your state from the drop down to receive information for your state.
