Dear Chair Granger, Ranking Member DeLauro, Chair Cole, Ranking Member Quigley, Chair Murray, Vice Chairman Collins, Chair Schatz, and Ranking Member Hyde-Smith:

As you work to finalize the fiscal year 2024 appropriations bill for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), please provide the highest possible funding for HUD's affordable housing programs. HUD's programs serve more than two million older adult households, including through HUD's flagship Section 202 Housing for the Elderly program and the Section 8 Project-Based Rental Assistance programs.

In August 2023, the HUD released 2021 data showing "the number of elderly people with chronic patterns of homelessness increased by an alarming 73%" between 2019 and 2021. Also, during this same two-year period, the number of people aged 65 and older experiencing sheltered homelessness increased by 10,000. Older adults are the fastest-growing age group of those experiencing homelessness, composing nearly half of the homeless population.

As described in HUD's 2023 recent report to Congress on worst case housing needs, 2.35 million older adult renter households with very low incomes spent more than half of their incomes on housing in 2021, an increase of 60% since 2011. These households are on the precipice of homelessness without Congressional action to preserve and expand the nation's affordable housing supply.

HUD's programs, including HUD's multifamily programs, are critical to preventing and ending homelessness and to meeting the nation's severe shortage of affordable housing.

In the fiscal year 2024 HUD appropriations bill, LeadingAge urges Congress to:

- Provide at least the Senate committee bill's \$1.08 billion for the Section 202 Housing for the Elderly program to fully renew all Project Rental Assistance Contracts and provide \$152 million for new Section 202 homes funding. The House committee bill would cut Section 202 funding by 15% compared to 2023.
- Provide at least the Senate committee bill's \$120 million for the full renewal of grant-funded service coordinators, as well as additional funds for new service coordinators.
- Provide at least \$6 million for rent increases for Section 202 Project Rental Assistance Contracts undergoing preservation conversion in the Rental Assistance Demonstration.
- Provide at least the Senate committee bill's \$15.79 billion for Section 8 Project-Based Rental Assistance renewals, including a new pool of \$32.9 million for rent adjustments to certain properties with health, safety, or operational deficiencies.
- Provide at least the Senate committee bill's \$3.9 billion for Homeless Assistance Grants.

Finally, we urge Congress to not enact any year-long continuing resolution, which would fund HUD programs at fiscal year 2023 levels for the entirety of fiscal year 2024 and thereby jeopardizing housing for nearly 700,000 HUD-assisted households.
