

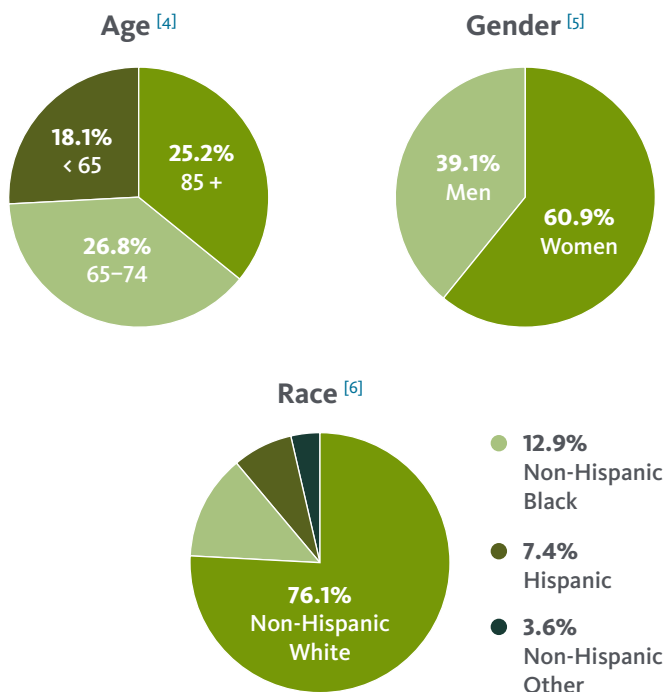
Home Health

Older adults who use home health providers have access to a range of medical and non-medical services that can help them transition from a hospital stay to their home. Typically, home health services are ordered by a physician (or other health professional working under a physician’s supervision). Medicare or Medicaid-certified organizations provide skilled nursing and other therapeutic services in the comfort of the client’s own home. Users of home health services typically need assistance with the activities of daily living (ADL), the fundamental skills required to live independently such as meal preparation, shopping, transportation, laundry, dressing and bathing.

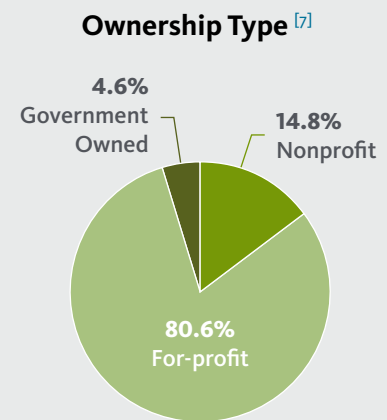
US SIZE & REACH

- 12,200 ^[1] home health agencies in the U.S.
