

Hospice

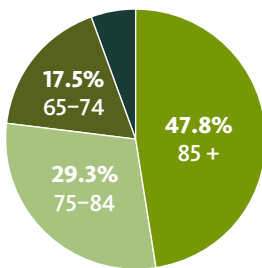
Terminally ill people who enter hospice care can avail themselves of a range of palliative care treatments that focus on reducing pain and other symptoms that cause suffering, while attending to their emotional and spiritual needs. The majority of hospice patients have a principal diagnosis of cancer. Hospice care prioritizes comfort and quality of life and offers patients nursing, social work, and chaplaincy services. Medicare or Medicaid-certified providers and non-medical home care providers can provide hospice care.

US SIZE & REACH

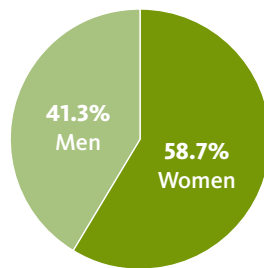
- 4,300 ^[1] hospices in the U.S.
- 1.4 million ^[2] people served
 - » 34.2% of hospices serve 1–100 people annually
 - » 34% of hospices serve 101–300 people annually
 - » 31.8% of hospices serve more than 300 people annually
- A hospice organization serves 353 ^[3] people a year on average

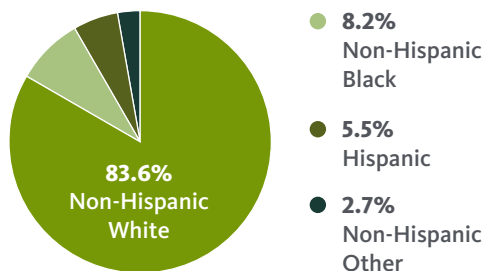
Age ^[4]



Gender ^[5]

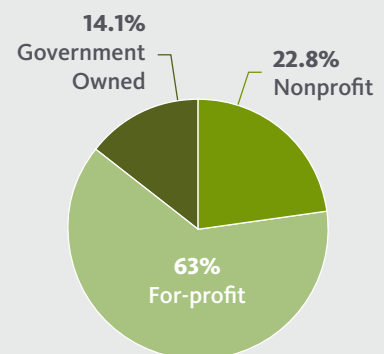


Race ^[6]
